LAST GENERAL MEETING INFORMATION AND PRESS RELEASE

ANNA is pleased to share with the securities community the main topics that were discussed during the last General Meeting of the Association, which was held in Lima, Peru, on November 25 & 26, 2010.

In accordance with the decision of the ANNA Board to invite industry specialists focusing on topics relevant to ANNA Members, Mr. Michel Canta Terrero, the Chairman of CONASEV, the Peruvian Regulator, gave a presentation on the developments of the Peruvian economy and an overview of current initiatives in that country.

Mr. Dan Kuhnel, the ANNA Chairman, gave an overview of the activities and key areas of focus for the Board during the last 6 months. Likewise, the Board members gave presentations on different topics, including:

- ISO 6166 Registration Authority Agreement: ANNA is currently working with ISO on the wording of a Service Level Agreement to formalize the interaction between both entities.
- The future of the ANNA Service Bureau (ASB): As the ASB needs to be updated to meet the demands of the market, negotiations with the current operators were initiated, in parallel to a RFP process.
- Status and Implementation of ISO Standards: The importance of Standards and their promotion on local markets were stressed during the meeting, and a summary of the Standards relevant to ANNA activities was presented to the members. These Standards are ISO 6166 (ISIN), ISO 10962 (CFI); ISO 18773 & 18874 (FISN and Abbreviations); and ISO 16372 (IGI).

Three National Numbering Agencies were accepted as new ANNA Partners (Comissão do Mercado de Capitais from Angola; Mongolian Securities Clearing House and Central Depository Co. Ltd.; and The Securities Board of Nepal). After these incorporations, the ANNA family comprises more than 120 countries.

KNOWING THE ANNA MEMBERS: MONGOLIAN NATIONAL NUMBERING AGENCY

Geographically speaking, Mongolia is a land locked country between PRC and Russian Federation. Economically, the country is now known to the world for its rich mineral resources.

Securities market was one of the unpopular businesses in Mongolia. In 1989, 70 years old socialist regime of Mongolia failed and started a new era of market economy. Within the new economic policy, the government decided to privatize enterprises that were owned by the state. The enterprises were formed into joint stock companies and shareholders are all Mongolian citizens who have purchased the shares with the coupons they received from the government. For registering these newly issued shares, the shareholders and to organize the trading, Mongolian Stock Exchange was established in 1991 and our company was one of the departments of MSE to settle the securities.

Now, Mongolian Securities Clearing House and Central Depository is an independent company with 100% state property. In our central depository, there are 2.9 million shares of 348 MSE listed companies with market capitalization of 1,209 billion MNT, including 1,883 thousand shares owned by state and local provinces. Recent years, Mongolian securities market is getting attractive to domestic and international investors due to mining companies that are going to be formed as joint stock companies. As an emerging market, it is time for Mongolia to step into world standard and provide services that would suit the investors and the issuers.

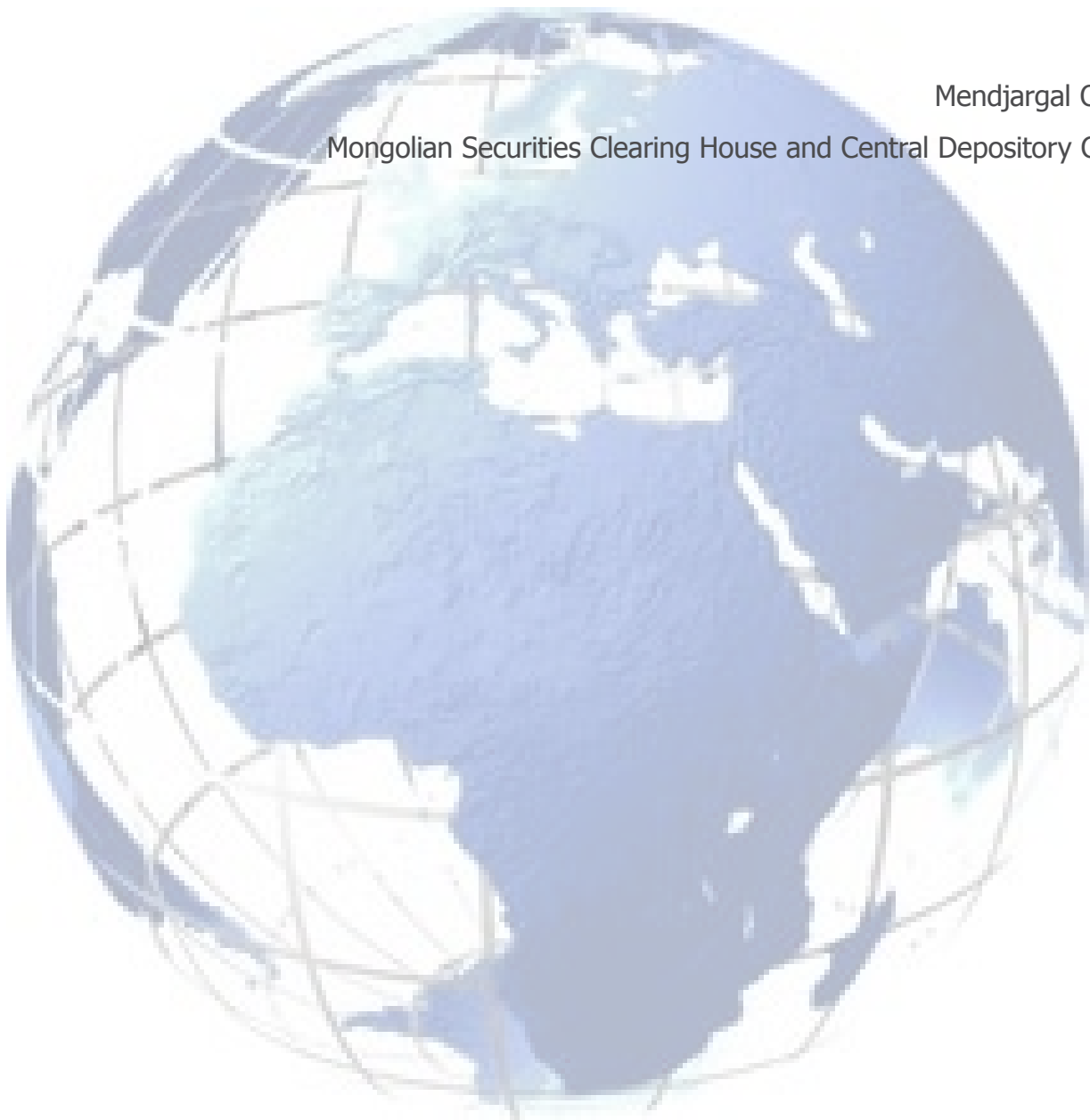
At the global scale, the integration of stock exchanges together with the application of electronic transactions facilitated by recent technological advancements have significantly increased the transaction size and volume at stock exchanges all over the world. Subsequently, strong changes in transactions influence post trade services sector in the way that minimize transaction cost, including clearing and settlement costs, in order to not let them become barriers for this development trend. London Stock Exchange is working with MSE for the market development and providing facilities of recent trading platform. This will bring the challenges in transactions influence our operation.

So far, Mongolian market saw itself as exceptional and has therefore imposed its own proprietary IT and procedures in operations. It is time for us to recognize that we all operate in a single global environment that calls for global basic standards. Standardization takes years of work and efforts of various technical groups and committees. As a result, standardization and interoperability can be the answer to addressing the industry challenges of improving efficiency, cost reduction and ability to process greater volume of transactions of complex instruments. Numbering the securities according to the standard is the fundament of cross border trading and it is our first effort to step together with global market. As a single central depository, MSCH&CD was the most eligible candidate to allocate the ISINs, because we handle both MSE traded and OTC traded securities.

MSCH&CD is proud to be one of the partners of ANNA that have members and partners from all around the world. Being a partner of ANNA has other benefits than being able to allocating ISINs. In this community, we have opportunities to meet other CSDs and securities institutions and we share the experiences of the industry. After all, it is one world and we thank ANNA for networking the NNAs for one purpose, to contribute to the securities industry.

REGIONAL NEWS

ALARG and AMEDA are pleased to share the latest events occurred in their regions with the ANNA Community.

As known, AMEDA successfully hosted the 11th Conference of Central Securities Depositories (CSD11) that was held in Cape Town, South Africa. Representatives from 70 Central Securities Depositories participated in the forum.

During the three-day conference, the formation of the World Forum of CSDs (WFC) was decided. Mr. Mohamed Abdel Salam of MCDR (Egypt), will take on the role of Chair of the newly formed WFC, and Mr. Yoshinobu Takeuchi of JASDEC (Japan) will be acting as WFC Vice-Chair. You will be able to find more information regarding this new group in the Press Release that was issued and is included in this Newsletter.

Ghana was welcomed as a new member of AMEDA, so now the Association comprises 23 depositories.

On ALARG's side, one of the most important news is the bilateral transaction-processing link that was established between the Chilean Depository and NNA (Depósito Central de Valores – DCV) and Euroclear Bank. Chile will be the fourth market in Latin America for which Euroclear Bank offers services for cross-border domestic securities transactions, following Argentina, Brazil and Mexico.

Chile, Peru and Colombia formally combined operations of their stock markets to form the Latin American Integrated Market (Mercado Integrado Latinoamericano, or MILA). As it was explained in the presentation that was given during the General Meeting held in Lima, this initiative aims to develop the capital market through the integration of the three countries, to provide investors with a greater supply of securities, issuers and also larger sources of funding. To give an idea of the importance of MILA, the unified market of these countries will become the first in the region in number of issuers, the second in market capitalization, and the third in terms of trading volume (after Brazil and Mexico).

As a final point, we would like to let you know that the next ACSDA Leadership Forum (ALF) will be held in Buenos Aires, on November 9-11, 2011. This forum is an important training and information sharing program, held every two years, and in this occasion it will be hosted by Caja de Valores S.A., together with Mercado de Valores de Buenos Aires S.A. (Merval), the Buenos Aires Stock Market.

REGIONAL CSD ASSOCIATIONS SET UP JOINT WORLD FORUM

The 11th Global Conference of Central Securities Depositories just concluded in Cape Town, South Africa. The conference brought together 230 delegates from 65 countries, representing 70 Central Securities Depositories.

During the three-day conference, the senior representatives of the five regional associations agreed that the time was right to formalize the relationship between the regional associations and announced the formation of the World Forum of CSDs (WFC). The WFC will build on the contribution of the CSD Contact Group over the past four years in enhancing inter association communications. The objective of the newly formed WFC is to provide a forum for the five Regional CSD associations to exchange information, discuss issues of common interest and increase their influence and engagement on cross-regional and global developments, as well as providing a common voice on issues relevant to the various associations and their members.

The Forum will have a Board composed of 10 members, namely the Chairs and Vice-Chairs of each of the five regional associations, with the Association that has most recently hosted the Global Conference of CSDs acting as chair for a two-year term. The Board will be supported by the Secretariats of the respective associations.

Mr. Mohamed Abdel Salam of MCDR (Egypt), representing the Africa and Middle East CSD Association, will take on the role of Chair of the newly formed WFC.

Mr. Yoshinobu Takeuchi of JASDEC (Japan) will be acting as WFC Vice-Chair.

The five regional CSD associations (representing 125 member CSDs) involved in the formation of the WFC are:

Background

The CCG was created in 2007 under the leadership of Yoshinobu Takeuchi, of the Japan Securities Depository Center Inc., at a Summit Session of Central Securities Depository CEOs during the 9th Conference of CSDs in Seoul, Korea. Mr. Takeuchi, representing ACG acted as chair of the CCG from 2007 until 2009. Mr. Joël Mérére, representing ECSDA took over as chair from 2009 until 2011. Since its formation, the CSD Contact Group has met 7 times and succeeded in deepening the expert dialogue among the 5 regional associations.

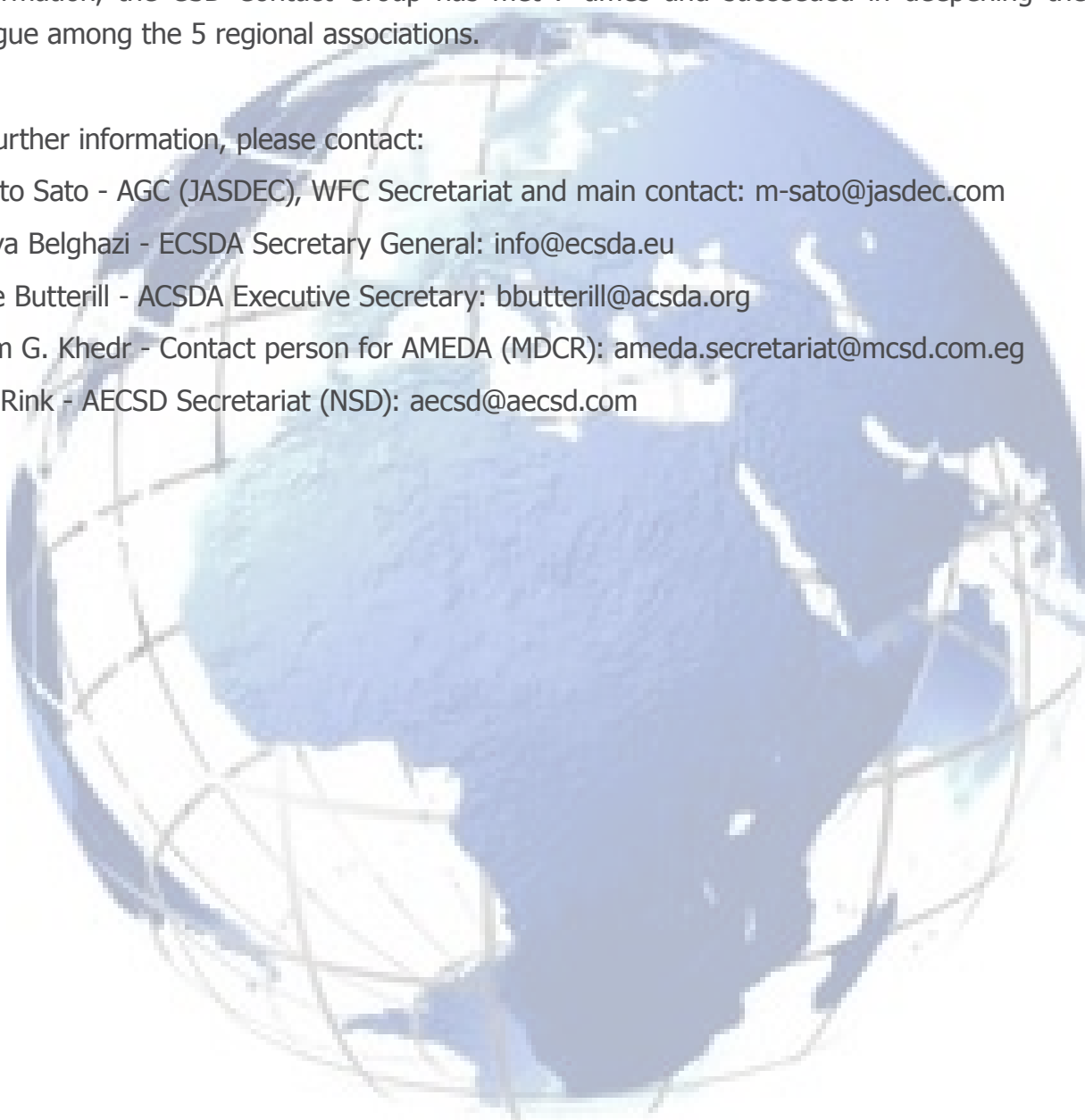

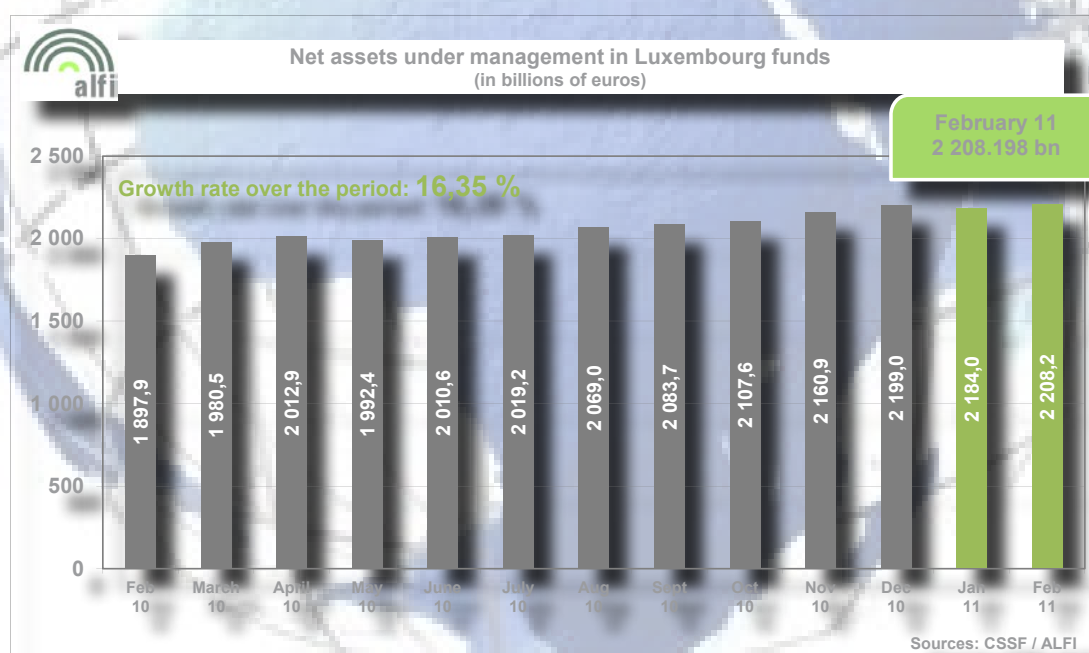

LUXEMBOURG - THE PLACE OF CHOICE FOR INVESTMENT FUNDS

Luxembourg is the largest investment funds market in Europe with EUR 2.2 trillions of assets under management,¹ split across more than 13,000 individual fund units.² In terms of investment policy, these fund units are split more or less equally between fixed income funds (25%), equity funds (27%) and mixed vehicles (27%), followed by funds of funds (15%). Fixed income funds attract more than 40% of the investment orders, with equities capturing 30%. Looking over the past 10 years, the Luxembourg fund industry has benefited from a spectacular inflow of funds, with a cumulative net growth of EUR 1.3 trillions (+144%) since December 2001, overcoming a contraction of EUR 500 billions in 2008. At European scale, Luxembourg accounts today for more than 25% of the overall fund industry, which has slightly over 8 trillions of assets under management (+74% since 2001, which is half the growth level that Luxembourg has recorded over the same period). France, Germany, Ireland and the United Kingdom are the other main markets in Europe. Together with Luxembourg, these countries represent 81% of the total assets in European-domiciled funds.³ Finally, at global scale, Luxembourg is the second largest market per fund domicile, behind the United States which has around EUR 9 trillions equivalent of assets under management.



The success of the fund industry in Luxembourg is due to a combination of factors, ranging from a flexible and business-friendly legal and regulatory environment to a strong pool of human expertise. It has also benefited - like other European and non-European countries - from the development of the UCITS (Undertaking for Collective Investment in Transferable Securities) model initiated some 25 years ago. Since then, UCITS have become the world's leading investment product, with strong brand recognition and impressive net sales – not only in Europe, but in Asia, the Middle East and Latin

America, and is recognised around the world as the investment product synonymous with safety, transparency and cost-efficiency. Luxembourg has successfully positioned itself as the global leader for cross-border distribution of investment funds, with the result that today more than 75% of UCITS funds distributed internationally are based in Luxembourg. Besides UCITS, Luxembourg also allows issuance of Undertakings for Collective Investment (UCI), Specialized Investment Funds (SIF), and Société d'Investissement en Capital à Risque (SICAR)

In Luxembourg, funds can be set up as a Fonds Commun de Placement (FCP), which is a contract between the fund manager and the investors that is sold in units, or as a Société d'Investissement à Capital Variable (SICAV) or Fixe (SICAF), which is a separate legal entity whose ownership is in the form of shares. Many Luxembourg investment funds are so-called umbrella funds, which consist of multiple sub-funds that in effect function as separate investment funds but form a single legal entity. This enables funds with different strategies or that are designed for different types of investor to be established within the same legal structure, which can reduce the funds' costs.


The investment funds industry, just as the other market segments, is facing a wave of regulatory changes (UCITS IV and V, MiFID, AIFM, CRD III and Securities Law Directives; PRIPs; Pension funds green paper; FATCA) that will transform fundamentally the way it operates. Regulators all over the world have taken action for greater transparency, improved client information and, ultimately, better protection. This trend is supported by investors, who demand greater oversight and are prepared to pay for additional safeguards (e.g. by switching from non-regulated to regulated products). At supervision level, the creation of a new European Securities & Markets Authority (ESMA) will also bring its lot of changes. The challenge for the Luxembourg marketplace will therefore be to adapt to the new environment without losing the momentum and the innovation that characterized it. And this adaptation is under way: Luxembourg has been the first European country to incorporate UCITS IV into national law in December 2010. The market professionals, regrouped in the ALFI association, have also elaborated an action plan, in response to the challenges posed by the credit crisis. They have developed five key priorities: investor knowledge, regulatory cooperation, product innovation, competitiveness and international development. All five are aimed at responding to higher investor expectations. ALFI notably built an on-line investor centre and opened a new representative office in Hong Kong; they also pushed the industry to adopt new standards such as the Funds Processing Passport (FPP) and the Key Investor Information Document (KID), and are actively preparing for the transition to Target-2 Securities, notably with the launch this autumn of LuxCSD, a new Luxembourg-based Central Securities Depository offering Central Bank Money settlement for funds and other security types.

The Luxembourg market place has also developed over the years a very efficient and resilient infrastructure to facilitate investment order routing, reporting, custody, settlement and corporate

actions processing. Investors and intermediaries can find general and detailed information (data and documents) on all Luxembourg-domiciled investment funds on-line at Finesti (www.finesti.com), a subsidiary of the Luxembourg Stock Exchange. The latter has also developed, with its secure portal e-file (www.e-file.lu), a real-time electronic channel to Luxembourg authorities⁴ for financial and regulatory reporting purposes. The e-file portal provides in addition a direct connection to the Luxembourg Stock Exchange for listing purposes, to Finesti for publication and dissemination of data, and to Clearstream (www.clearstream.com) for ISIN allocation and eligibility for clearing & settlement purposes.

Order routing is facilitated via electronic and secured platforms such as Vestima+, a Clearstream solution, that links fund distributors to transfer agents, and that provide users with the option to generate automatically settlement instructions to Clearstream or to other settlement places. Clearstream also facilitates, through the operation of the Central Facility for Funds (CFF), an efficient and cost-effective settlement and custody model for fund agents, distributors and custodians that also offers best practice in corporate actions processing and supports the distribution of trailer fees.

All these factors contribute to position Luxembourg as the place of reference for the investment funds industry. Thanks to its competitive, stable and secure environment, and to its robust and efficient infrastructure, Luxembourg is ideally placed to benefit from increased growth levels, as cross-border investment develops.

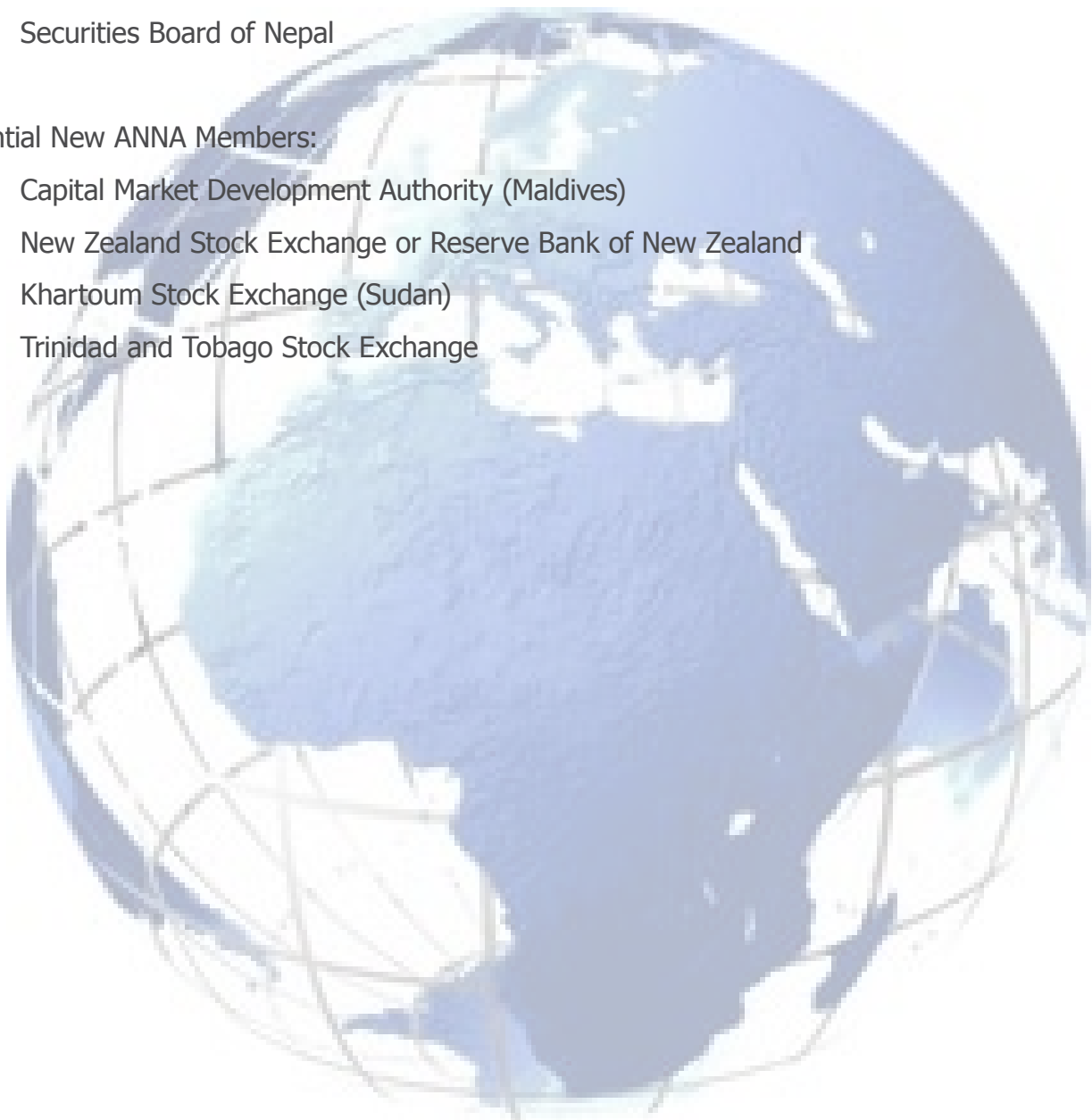

ESMA AND ISO STANDARDS UNDER ANNA'S CONTROL

The European Securities and Markets Authority (ESMA) contributes to safeguarding the stability of the European Union's financial system by ensuring the integrity, transparency, efficiency and orderly functioning of securities markets, as well as enhancing investor protection. In particular, ESMA fosters supervisory convergence both amongst securities regulators, and across financial sectors.

ESMA, which became a European Authority in January 2011, as its predecessor, the late Committee of European Securities Regulators (CESR), will continue to use and promote ISO standards, particularly ISO 10962 (CFI) and ISO 6166 (ISINs) as a critical means of exchanging and matching data in the field of financial services.

In particular, the two standards have been used in the field of transaction reporting among European national financial supervisors since 2007 when the Transaction Reporting Exchange Mechanism (TREM) and, later, the Instrument Reference Data System (IRDS) were implemented in response to requirements set out in the Markets in Financial Instruments Directive (MiFID).

Transaction reporting data is needed first and foremost to enable supervisors to detect and pursue suspected instances of market abuse, client abuse or other breaches of relevant MiFID and Market Abuse Directive provisions. Therefore, the correct routing of accurate transaction reports is of paramount importance so that European regulators can fulfil their duties in a timely and efficient manner.

Taking over from a static table used between the launch of TREM in November 2007 and its full implementation in June 2009, the IRDS is a central repository storing financial instruments admitted to trading on EEA regulated markets and their exchange-traded derivatives. Instrument reference data is provided to ESMA by the all EU regulated markets through their national supervisor using the Classification for Financial Instruments (CFI) and ISINs or the Alternative Instrument Identifier (AII) for identification.

Lately the scope of the IRDS was extended to include ISO reference data, among which the CFI standard, MIC and BIC codes, so that national authorities are now receiving up-to-date and harmonised reference data on a regular basis for a better straight-through processing of transaction reports. On this occasion, its name was shortened into RDS (for Reference Data System) to reflect the broader coverage.

Various checks have been put in place to ensure that the instrument reference data provided by the regulated markets is valid (exempli gratia the check digit of the ISIN has to be valid against the algorithm of ISIN validation) and the various attributes are consistent with each other, but the main objective of the system is to define the so-called Relevant Competent Authority, that is the Member State where all transaction reports on the instrument should be forwarded.

In this respect, a complex algorithm was designed that firstly goes by the first letter of the CFI code of the instrument to determine the Member State to which all trades in the instrument should be reported. In consequence, a proper CFI standard and the correct allocation of the CFI code by the exchange is critical for regulators as this piece of information is then used for transaction routing purposes in TREM.

In order to meet those requirements, ESMA has taken over a few pieces of work that were undertaken by CESR. Regular contacts are maintained with ANNA to provide examples of possible improvements of the standard that would ease markets and regulators' work by adapting it to the rapidly evolving landscape of financial instruments and filling in the current loopholes (like classification of all kinds of certificates).

Guidelines for the attention of market operators are also being drafted with a view to helping them to provide accurate instrument reference data and ESMA stands ready to canvass ANNA's views and then consult on the draft document.

TREM hence benefits from RDS data to enable regulators to exchange transaction reports on those instruments – therefore also identified in transaction reports with either an ISIN or an AII code – but also on OTC derivative instruments whose underlying is admitted to trading on EEA markets since the end of 2010.

For the reporting of OTC derivatives, it is interesting to note that European regulators decided to depart from the use of ISO standards. The CFI was not considered suitable for the purpose of OTC derivative classification and it was decided that mandating all market participants to allocate ISIN codes to all OTC derivative instruments would be a too costly and burdensome request. However, ISINs are used to identify the underlying instruments and may be used for their OTC derivatives where available.

This matter of fact poses serious questions and has become a source of discussion among regulators in the context of the new regulatory requirements, whether already issued – Dodd-Frank Act in the US – or the anticipated European Market Infrastructure Regulation (EMIR).

If European regulatory bodies are willing to leverage the existing infrastructures and therefore to continue and even to extend cooperation with ISO and its registration authorities, they are looking forward to seeing how ISO and ANNA will make good use of their expertise to address the current and future challenges of, for instances, Legal Entity and OTC contract classification and identification.
